Great news from the City of San Antonio: in our first quarter report we highlighted the City of San Antonio's dismal (less than 1%) spending in goods and supplies with African Americans. The payments made to African-American vendors in that category is now 16%.

Minority Business Contracting with CPS Energy



CPS Energy is a huge supporter of local events and our chamber. That is appreciated. However, you will see from the numbers below their poor showing with African-American suppliers/contractors.

2016 is the first year CPS started tracking their spending with SMWVBE.


Spurs Entertainment

Alamo College District Bond

Dr. Adena Loston, president of St. Philip's College made an in-depth presentation on the Alamo College Bond Measure on the May 6, 2017 ballot. Voters approved the 450 million dollar bond. St. Philip's will receive an unprecedented \$82 million. The breakdown is as follows:
